BSNC sold its Seppala Drive building to Kawerak in June 2004 and made the decision to move into its property on Front Street. With the sale of the old building, BSNC has been able to consolidate office space and do business in a convenient location. BSNC moved into its new offices in November 2004.

As spring begins its annual thaw and rebirth of the Seward Peninsula, Bering Straits Native Corporation's (BSNC) operations are also experiencing rejuvenation and growth. After a long and cold winter, sprinkled with a few warm days, it is a pleasure to see spring arrive in our homeland. So too is it a pleasure to report to you that the hard work and dedication of BSNC staff and the Board is finally being rewarded, and we expect that BSNC should report a decent profit from operations. Your annual report will be reaching you sometime this summer, before our annual meeting in October, to verify that BSNC is once again experiencing growth and profitability.

Although BSNC is finally experiencing a satisfactory year, the Board and staff feel we still have a long way to go before we can consider ourselves to be completely out of the "long and cold winter" of our past. We have a huge historical deficit to overcome before we can call ourselves successful. We have potential future settlements with village corporations, which are currently holding BSNC subsurface real estate in lieu of receiving full payment from BSNC. We also need to focus on re-establishing the strong liquidity and cash position we had

prior to the recent stock market losses, and the huge payment we had to make to the IRS, all within the last three years. These are just some of the hurdles your current Board and staff are trying to overcome to bring BSNC back to "square one." Although we are not completely there, having a good year like we did this year brings BSNC much closer to being the successful and profitable operation we are working toward.

Regardless of the many ups and downs we have experienced together through our corporation, we have every reason to feel optimistic about the future. As we have mentioned in the past, the gold is maintaining a price of around \$400 per ounce. Besides Rock Creek and other areas around Nome, our other subsurface properties in the region around Solomon, Council, White Mountain and towards Teller/Mary's Igloo, all have potential resource development. Along with that, the many airport and road construction projects, the construction of new consolidated tank farms throughout our region, and projects like the Nome Harbor project, all require subsurface materials which will be purchased from BSNC. Our capable Land Department, made up of Matt Ganley and Irene

Anderson, is working hard for BSNC in this area of development. The Land Committee for BSNC is one of our most active committees that spearhead all of our land and resource development.

In addition to our resource development, our federal contracts are continuing to grow and show more returns; our hotel the Aurora Inn (with the purchase of the Ponderosa Inn giving us more rooms to rent) is the "best hotel in Nome" and is showing increased revenue; BSNC's strategic move of its offices into the BSNC Building (formally the Old Federal Building)

has enabled that operation to show a profit, and also puts our regional headquarters right in the middle of the business district of Front Street; and our apartments are showing full capacity and with the conversion of the Aurora Executive Suites into long term rentals, are also producing larger returns. All of this is being handled by the same number of people, except the need for more accounting staff, which reflects the added work load. Life should be good.

We appreciate the shareholders' patience as we work hard in making our corporation more successful. With spring on us, summer can't be very far.

BSNC Village/Regional Land Managers' Meeting

Twenty-two representatives of village corporations, seven municipal government and three tribal representatives from the BSNC region met in Nome on April 6 & 7, 2005. Presenters from the Department of Commerce, Community & Economic Development (DCCED), Bureau of Land Management (BLM), U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Kawerak and BSNC provided information on various land issues within the region.

Training was provided on the ANCSA 14(c) requirements by Keith Jost, Ruth St. Amour, Peter MacKay and Josie Bahnke of DCCED and Allan Breitzman of BLM. Ronna Engstrom, Kawerak Village Planning Specialist, conducted a review of the Bering Straits region's Community Profile Map project and explained Site Control issues for communities. An example of using aerial photos in community planning efforts, for infrastructure as well as economic development ideas was presented by Ted Meyer, Kawerak Economic Development Planner.

"Overall the training was very

informative," said Fred Sagoonick who is the General/Land Manager for Shaktoolik Native Corporation. For several years, Shaktoolik Native Corporation has been working toward completing the 14(c)(3) reconveyance process. Information learned at this training has allowed Shaktoolik Native Corporation to move forward in submitting its Map of Boundaries to BLM.

The USDA – Rural Development staff, Leo Rasmussen & Randy Morton provided information on site control issues for home and business loan opportunities in rural Alaska.

A review of the regional land status and survey information was presented by BLM staff Tom Sparks, Joe Labay and Craig Frichtl. Ron Scherler of BLM assisted with the Sitnasuak Native Corporation survey project review.

Irene Anderson and Matt Ganley of BSNC provided information on tide & current definitions, trespass, Internet use for research of land documents, Global Positioning System use, site control for community

infrastructure, use of cooperative agreement and resolutions, mineral and resource exploration processes, gravel operations and material sales. Eric Larsen of Kawerak assisted with demonstrating the use of GPS's with computer generated maps.

Agency staff provided individual sessions with the village representatives to discuss site specific issues.

The group scheduled the fall meeting to be held in Nome on September 29 & 30, 2005 prior to the BSNC Annual Meeting of Shareholders.

Eskimo Doll Artist Dolly Spencer dies

Dolly Nuguluk Spencer died at 9:30 p.m. on April 6th, at the Homer's South Peninsula Hospital with family by her side, due to complications from cancer treatment.

Dolly's recorded birth was made in Kotzebue after she was born in Deering, Alaska on March 30, 1930 to York (Poovruktowk) and Grace (Alluluck) Mendenhall. Both of her parents are from Ikpek, Alaska. She told stories of her family's subsistence lifestyle while living in the Cape Espenburg and Krusenstern area, Kotzebue, Immachuk River, and Sheshalik camps, and especially Deering where she learned to make her famous Eskimo dolls from an elder.

To escape a fixed marriage, Dolly and her mother, Allukluk, came to Nome in 1946 to have her first son, Perry T. Mendenhall. Dolly supported her son and mother at the Big Hurrah mine working as a cook and a cat skinner as needed. In Nome, she worked as a waitress and bar maid at restaurants and bars and practiced her seamstress skills in making parkas and mukluks. Robert and Linda Prout came from her first marriage with Tommy Prout, (who passed away Feb. 13th, 2005 at Emmett, Idaho). Her twins Dean and Jerry Killingrock were born February 1957 in Nome and were adopted out.

Dolly met, and married her second husband, James Arthur

Spencer II, in Teller, Alaska on October 10th, 1958. During the next 46 years, they raised Virginia, Victor and Jimmy Spencer III and lived in Wales, Fairbanks, and Glennallen before calling Homer their home in 1970. Both Jim and Dolly became dedicated Christians in 1967 while living in Glennallen and shared this life with family, friends and strangers alike by sending many care packages to them.

Dolly's many handmade portrait dolls, outfitted with parkas and paraphernalia, have gained her recognition and awards since the 1960s. In 1996, Dolly was recognized as a "master traditional artist" by the National Heritage Fellowship. Her Eskimo Doll shows allowed her to travel across the State and to the Smithsonian in 1984 to teach doll making to children and adults alike, as well as to share her Eskimo and Christian heritage at the same time. This travel also allowed her to work on her family tree, showing relatives from Unalakleet to Northwest Territory, Canada and Chukotka, Russia, as well as in the interior and lower 48. Her grand daughter, Jessica Veldstra, carries on her traditional doll sewing and hopefully some of her students will do the same. She made dolls for her children as their cultural heritage memento. One of Dolly's on-going ambitions was to have her grandmother's seal oil heart shaped lamp returned to the family from an East coast museum.

Dolly was preceded in death by her parents, York and Grace Mendenhall; brothers, Raymond, Perry, William and Collins Mendenhall; sisters, Mary Ahnangnatoguk and Dora Mulch; her son, Robert Prout; and grandson, Robert Eskilido.

Dolly is survived by her second husband of 46 years, James Arthur Spencer II; children, Perry T. (and Nancy) Mendenhall, Linda Kline, twins Dean and Jerry Killingrock, step-daughter Terry Ann Plummer, Virginia (and Nathan) Wise, Victor (and Debbie) Spencer, and Jimmy Spencer III. Each of her children will receive an Eskimo doll made by her. Dolly is survived by her grandchildren, Dan, Robin, Lesley, Frank, Eli Sigvan, Lisa, Roy, Linda, Roberta, Evelene, Jessica, Jacob, Janyce, Josiah and Matthew; and in-laws, Allen Ahnangnatoguk, Mary Ann Mendenhall and Myrna Mendenhall. Dolly had 25 great grandchildren, 2 great-great children and numerous nieces and nephews.

He is a positive role model for the younger generations of our region.

Lindsey's favorite hobby has always been snowmachining. He says, "It is an expensive hobby and requires a lot of responsibility on my part. I have worked summers and after school since my sophomore year in high school so that I could

purchase my own machines, parts and gas." Entering this years Nome-Golovin snowmachine race as a rookie, he took first place in the Class "C" division, had the best overall time of two hours 17 minutes and 54 seconds, and also received a bonus for the best rookie time. He had another great finish in the Nome Cannonball snowmachine race, finishing in second place, just two seconds behind the first place racer.

News from Nome Native Youth Leadership Organization

Members of the Nome Native Youth Leadership Organization (NNLYO) have been actively involved in two exciting projects this year. NNYLO has partnered with the Bering Sea Women's Group (BSWG) to disseminate information on preventing elder abuse.

Nome Elder, Jacob Ahwinona, met with NNYLO early this fall to help develop an informational brochure that BSWG will be publishing.

Cori Eide, Vanessa Tahbone, Alyssa Gray, Gregory Saclamana, Jessie Russell and Maddy Alvanna-Stimpfle traveled to Stebbins, St. Michael, Shaktoolik, Koyuk, Teller, Shishmaref and Wales to give presentations on elder abuse.

The students performed role plays showing examples of elder abuse: cashing elders' checks and using their money, not making sure elders have their medication, not making sure elders have food and talking back to elders. The students explained the different types of elder abuse: physical abuse, emotional abuse, neglect and abandonment and financial or material exploitation.

Finally, the members of NNYLO shared their messages that elders are the key to our past and the guiding star for our future, elders are a wealth of knowledge and wisdom to treasure, survival of our Native culture depends on respecting our elders and we must treasure our elders. NNYLO would like to

thank all the people in the villages who welcomed them into the communities.

NNYLO continues to raise funds to help the Sitnasuak Elders Committee erect statues of Constantine Uparazuck and Gabriel Adams at Anvil City Square. Constantine and Gabriel were two young Native men involved with the Three Lucky Swedes. So far, NNYLO has raised \$12,744.00 with contributions from local organizations and individuals.
